Letter from the Oakland Peace Center founder and director

In 2010, a dozen changemakers gathered to imagine a space where people and nonprofits doing social service, social justice and social change could work with each other instead of struggling to help a few people at a time. The vision of the Oakland Peace Center was born. We officially launched MLK weekend 2012.

The fact is, five years ago, we didn't realize that by 2015:

- We would play a major role in reducing displacement of nonprofits during a housing and office space crisis in Oakland;
- we would collectively plan an annual event where over 300 community members receive basic skills in meditation, anti-racism and food justice as well as nurturing their souls with music and spoken word poetry.
- forty organizations would find ways to partner so that the impact of their work would reach from homeless shelters to cancer wards to prisons to playgrounds.

2016 holds a lot of work for us as we rehab a historic building and make it a space for all people. It also holds a lot of work to create deeper connections and a shared vision for how to create a Bay Area rooted in equity, access and dignity for all.
